Mile Hi Veterans Information

Throughout history, Latinos have answered our Nation's call to defend freedom or overcome tyranny wherever it is found. Spaniards supported our fledging country in its fight for independence from England. Latinos wore both the Blue and the Gray in the American Civil War. In World War I, they came from all parts of the country to fight in the bloody trenches of France and Belgium. During World War II, Latinos fought from island to island in the South Pacific. They risked their lives on the cold and barren Aleutian Islands; on the burning sands of North Africa; in the hedgerows and dense forests of Europe; and in the skies over Germany. Latino names are chiseled on the silent ranks of bone-white crosses in far-off places like Hawaii, the Philippines, and Normandy. Latinos courageously placed themselves in harms-way in the frigid hills of Korea; the steaming jungles of Southeast Asia; the lethal flatlands of Iraq; the mountains of Afghanistan; and countless obscure places around the globe. Often unrecognized, Latinos never asked why. They just asked where and when and served on land, sea and in the air with honor and courage.
